## Impaired lives

American secular universities and colleges are the best equipped, staffed, and endowed in history. But they are virtual wastelands when it comes to truth. There was a time when it was assumed that learning to know God was an essential part of education. But today, in spite of the huge investment by parents, foundations, businesses, and government, students accumulate knowledge without wisdom, skills without purpose, and ideas without Truth.

### A battle for hearts, souls, and minds is engaged on today's campus.

College students have the potential to be leaders in tomorrow's church and society. They are making long-lasting decisions about beliefs, values, relationships, and careers. They are bombarded with moral and spiritual options. Their choices will even affect their eternal destinies. But what ideas will fill their minds and shape their thinking?

#### Who will nourish their hearts and souls?

Only 1% of the faculty at elite universities describe themselves as "born again." More than half of all professors believe that the Bible is a book of fables and say they have "unfavorable" feelings toward evangelicals. Approximately a quarter of those teaching college students regard themselves as either atheistic or agnostic.

Students are regularly taught that following Jesus diminishes their ability to think. Education that ought to bring spiritual development actually leads most students away from the Christian faith. Only 20% of the high school students who grow up in churches will still be actively involved in the Christian faith at the age of thirty.<sup>2</sup> Students with little or no faith background will continue to pursue a life apart from God.

Without Christian formation and teaching, most young women and men now in college will lead lives outside the church in the year 2020. And in Western culture, secularism will continue to undermine moral and social values. InterVarsity's call is to stand against this cultural decline, to raise up young people who are biblically-trained Christian leaders, and to increase the number of Christian faculty on campus.

- 1 A study released in October 2006 by Neil Gross of Harvard University and Solon Simmons of George Mason University focused on the religious and political attitudes of professors at America's colleges and Universities.

  A 2007 survey conducted by San Francisco-based Institute for Jewish and Community Research reported 53% of professors felt "unfavorable" toward evangelicals. Its director and chief pollster, Gary A. Tobin, labeled this statistic "explosive... There is no question this is revealing bias and prejudice." He found no comparable ill-feeling towards Jews and Buddhists.
- 2 According to a 2006 study by The Barna Group, most twentysomethings disengage from active participation in the Christian faith during their young adult years despite strong levels of spiritual activity during the adolescence.



# Initiating change

#### Why Now?

Today, there is a great opportunity on campus to influence the future. Though ill-defined, student interest in "spirituality" is high. Many are searching for meaning, but do not know where to turn for answers.

Today, college students live in a postmodern, ethnically diverse, tech-savvy world. Their access to the Internet, instant messaging, and blogging brings both global awareness and global connections that create unprecedented opportunities for them to affect social change worldwide.

Today, there is a looming leadership deficit in both the profit and nonprofit sectors. This deficit provides a special opportunity for intentionally prepared young leaders to shape society. <sup>3</sup>



We have already begun to pilot our new chapter planting strategy. New fellowships have been launched at a variety of schools, including:

# Implementing our vision for 2020 and beyond

To influence the leaders of 2020, we need to reach them today. Therefore, we have developed a **five year strategy** to reach this generation of students and faculty.

#### New Lives \$1,700,000

By the grace and empowerment of God, we will increase the number of new believers by one-third (to 3,000 per year). Several pilot strategies that have already shown great promise will be expanded including: hosting evangelistic events on more campuses, raising up a new generation of campus evangelists, and providing more extensive evangelism training for students, faculty, and staff.

#### New Leaders \$2,600,000

Invest deeply in gifted student leaders, young managers, promising minority staff, Greek and International Students staff, future senior leaders, and four training centers. In the process, we will develop women and men who – for decades to come – will be Christian leaders on campus, in the marketplace, and in the church.

#### New Witnessing Communities \$4,600,000

By 2012, we will reach 42,000 students and faculty per year, an increase of 27%. To do so, we will plant 100 new campus groups, increase the number of students involved in 100 existing campus groups by a third, and train 50 faculty volunteers to launch faculty chapters. This will require new types of training, mentoring, and start-up funding. We will plant and build witnessing communities that have a growing presence on campus and will be sustainable for years to come.

#### New Call to Global Missions \$1,100,000

Since 1946, God has used the Urbana Student Missions Convention to call students to His purposes in the world. By one estimate, up to one-third of all evangelical missionaries from North America attribute their calling, at least in part, to an Urbana experience. In 2009, we plan to enhance Urbana's impact by recruiting a record 25,000 delegates and by hosting 5 curricular tracks.

## Opportunities to Give

### Current gifts may be made in a variety of ways

Cash gifts are always welcome.

Gifts of **appreciated securities** held for more than one year are tax-deductible for their full value and avoid capital gains tax when transferred directly to InterVarsity.

Gifts made using **retirement plan assets** may be appropriate for those over the age of 59½. In particular, direct transfers to InterVarsity from IRAs during 2006 and 2007 by those over age 70½ may be especially attractive.

Gifts of **real estate, business interests,** and many other assets can also provide current support for InterVarsity. Significant tax advantages are often available when these gifts are made in accordance with certain procedures.

A **Charitable Lead Trust** makes distributions to InterVarsity during a predetermined period and afterwards returns the principal to the donor or a designated beneficiary.

#### Opportunities to make Planned Gifts

**Bequests** to InterVarsity can be arranged through your will or living trust. They may be for a specific amount, for a specific asset, or for all or a percentage of the residue of your estate. These gifts are deductible for estate tax purposes.

**Life insurance** policies may be transferred to InterVarsity. You will receive current tax benefits while providing for InterVarsity's future. Sometimes the value of this type of gift will be larger than the amount you invested.

Leaving **retirement plan assets** to InterVarsity upon death can avoid both income and estate taxes.

A **Charitable Remainder Trus**t can be designed to suit a wide variety of donor situations. The trust distributes funds to InterVarsity only after providing income to you and/or others for life or a term of years. You also receive current tax benefits when the trust is established.

A **Charitable Gift Annuity** is a simple contractual agreement with InterVarsity. In exchange for your gift of cash or appreciated assets, InterVarsity promises to make fixed payments for life to you (or to any one or two individuals you designate). You receive a tax deduction for the year in which the annuity is established, and part of each annuity payment is tax-free for a number of years.
